Emergency Preparedness for AAC users

Is your AAC user ready for an emergency? In addition to having phrases programmed into their device such as "I have a speech disorder; I use this device to talk", "I need help", "My phone number is:_____", it is important to prepare for the worst and have no-tech laminated paper communication boards (preferably with the same layout and symbols/ words that their high-tech device has) carried with them at all times. In the case of a loss of power or a natural disaster, these boards can help your AAC user communicate with you, emergency services, and other important people. Keep these boards in your emergency kit, along with all medications, medical information, insurance cards, contact information for support team (caregivers, grandparents, speech therapists, etc.), written instructions for how emergency response teams should communicate with the AAC user at all times, and other emergency necessities.
